Yang began publishing his comics under his Humble Comics in 1996. 10 years laster, he released his most popular work (*American Born Chinese*) through First Second Books. The book was the first graphic novel to ever be nominated for a National Book Award.

Currently Yang is working for Dark Horse Comics as a writer for comic continuation for the popular Avatar: The Last Airbender series and has recently published his two-volume graphic novel Boxers & Saints.

Yang is also teaching at Hamline University for their MFA program in Writing for Children and Young Adults.


